



The Golden Trowel Award was established by the Grand Lodge of Texas to recognize Masons who have consistently demonstrated exemplary service and leadership. Recipients display commitment to Masonic principles and have shown dedication to the teaching of Masonry. It is the highest Grand Lodge-sanctioned honor a Lodge can bestow upon a worthy Brother.

Gray Lodge No. 329 is proud to present Doug W. Hissong, a dedicated Mason who has honorably served the Masonic fraternity as an officer and Past Master (2016-2017) of Gray Lodge, with the Golden Trowel Award.

GRAY LODGE NO. 329

Gray Lodge No. 329 was originally chartered by the Grand Lodge of Texas in 1870, and has been in continuous Masonic service for 152 years, making it the second-oldest Masonic Lodge in the Houston area. Named for Col. William Fairfax Gray, the first Clerk of the Supreme Court of Texas, Gray Lodge No. 329 currently has one of the most diverse memberships of any regular Texas Masonic Lodge, with active members hailing from a dozen different nations representing all three of the world's major religions.

Alexander Joseph Di Caro, MD., Part Two

[Editor's note: Brother Hoffpauir's two-part profile of Gray Lodge #329 member Bro. Di Caro began in the Winter 2021 issue of Texas Freemason Magazine, and we reprinted it with permission in the January 2022 Gray Line. The current issue of Texas Freemason contains the second—but certainly not the final!—part of Bro. Di Caro's story, which we reprint here for you, again with permission.]

Statues to Mexico

Through his ties with Shriners International in Tampa, Di Caro found himself involved with a rather interesting adventure in Old Mexico in 2014-15. It involved the rather questionable transportation of two bronze statues - one of which being the well-known Shriner walking with a crutch carrying a small child - to the Shrine Hospital in Mexico City.

"It seems the gentleman responsible to find safe passage to Mexico City of a couple of bronze statues to place in the entrance of the Shriners hospital there knew I donated lots of medical instruments to Mexico from San Antonio. How could 'I' get them down there?" laughs Di Caro.

Wife Sandra had the answer: they would wrap them up and drive them to Mexico City. 'Stashed' among the couple's luggage in the back of the car went the two heavily wrapped statues. Past US and Mexican customs they maneuvered. All was well until reaching the final Mexican check point 10-12 miles south of Nuevo Laredo at Anahuac in the Mexican state of Tamaulipas.

"Senor, what do you have wrapped up in those packages?" spoke the border guard in the finest of English. After guarded, but truthful, explanation by Di Caro the guard rubbed his chin and smiled, "No problem brother – I am a Mason too."

Dyslexia

Dr. Di Caro became involved with the Scottish Rite Dyslexia program when he noticed his son Bryan was unable to read by the second grade. He then looked into the 2nd Baptist School in Houston which took in slow learners where he learned that Bryan's problem could be dyslexia. Di Caro soon moved to Jourdanton and opened his business in San Antonio where he was told to take the child to the Dallas SR Hospital for testing.

There he asked Anna Rammie to go down to Jourdanton where she located Brenda Franklin, wife of County Judge Thomas Franklin, who had been trained in the Dallas program. They worked out the particulars that launched the effort. Dyslexic programs now cover most of the school districts in both Atascosa a McMullen Counties. Di Caro became instrumental in the introduction of dyslexic training for students in the Jourdanton school system when he purchased program books set up after-school training for seven or eight children in the area.

Later Bryan off-handily said, "Dad, I forgot my sun glasses. When I have them, I can read this pretty good." Dr. Lucius Wade then told Di Caro that the introduction of color separates, rather than overlaps, letters and makes them easier to put in word and sentence form. Bryan began wearing his sun glasses in class and started making good grades. He then graduated from

Jourdanton High School and Texas A&I – now UTAM at Kingsville – and is now a successful entrepreneur in the home building and ministorage fields.

While at Texas A&I, Bryan was under the tutelage of Mary Hernandez, Assistant Professor of English, under Dr. John Lowe, Prof. of English, who, together, held classes for dyslexic students at the university.

DRs. DeBakey, Cooley, Di Caro, and the Artificial Heart

Doctor Michael Ellis DeBakey was born to Lebanese Maronite Christian immigrant parents in Lebanon September 7th, 1908. The family moved to Lake Charles, LA, where the name was eventually anglicized from its original spelling AlBinali. DeBakey read the entire Encyclopedia Britannica before entering high school. At age 23 he graduated from Tulane University School of Medicine in New Orleans becoming a medical prodigy when he created the roller pump – a medical device that provided continuous blood flow during operations. DeBakey used the device to transfuse blood directly from donor to patient. This was before blood banks became common. Twenty years later it became a crucial part of the heart-lung machine used in open-heart surgery.

He completed surgical fellowships in Europe before returning to Tulane in 1937. During World War II he helped develop Mobile Army Surgical Hospital (MASH) units which became key elements of medical care placed near the front lines during the Korean War. He later established the Veterans Administration Medical Center Research System. The Michael E. DeBakey International Cardiovascular Surgical Society, founded 1976, which was later renamed the Michael E. DeBakey International Surgical Society, was founded in his honor.

Among his credits in surgical innovations were the coronary bypass, carotid endarterectomy, artificial hearts, and ventricular assist devices. He was presented the Presidential Medal of Freedom, National Medal of Science, and Congressional Gold Medal. He led in operations on over 60,000 patients, including several heads of state.

Described as a "tough taskmaster," DeBakey was said to be "sweet as dripping honey" to patients and medical students but brutal with surgical residents. He had a reputation of terrorizing co-workers who fell short of his standards.

Doctor Denton Cooley was born in Houston in 1920. He was the founder and Surgeon-in-Chief of the Texas Heart Institute, Chief of Cardiovascular Surgery and clinical partner at Baylor St. Luke's Medical Center, Consultant in Cardiovascular Surgery at Texas Children's Hospital, and Clinical Professor of Surgery at the University of Texas Health Science Center in Houston. He studied Pre-Med at UT Medical Branch in Galveston and received his Medical Degree and surgical training at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. He was called to active duty in the Army Medical Corps in 1946. He was discharged with the rank of Captain in 1948 before returning to complete his Residency at Johns Hopkins. He was hired by Dr. DeBakey in 1951.

On April 4, 1969 Cooley, with the help of DeBakey's artificial-heart technician, Dr. Domingo Liotta, took the artificial heart from DeBakey's lab and implanted it in one of Cooley's patients at St. Luke's. Di Caro, who was in the operating room had stepped out for a break, and reentered when the team did the, now historic, procedure. The patient lived 36 hours. DeBakey had developed the artificial device in his Baylor lab with funds from the National Heart Institute. Later

Cooley defended his actions as a desperate attempt to save a life. Liotta justified his contribution through frustration from limited time he claimed DeBakey was putting into the project.

DeBakey, it is true, had not sought approval to use the device in human patients due to a lack of evidence of its success in animal trials. Learning of the Cooley implant during a National Heart Institute meeting, he flew back to Houston and began an investigation, announcing Cooley's unauthorized action broke federal rules and jeopardized Baylor's grants. Cooley later said his actions were justified and that he had been performing more heart operations than DeBakey on a yearly basis: that he considered himself the appropriate person to do the first implant of the artificial device. He then resigned from his Baylor position.

The parties did not reconcile their differences until October 27, 2007. DeBakey and Cooley exchanged warm handshakes during a ceremony when DeBakey accepted a lifetime achievement award from the Denton A. Cooley Cardiovascular Surgical Society shortly before DeBakey was presented the Congressional Gold Medal by then President George W Bush in Washington, DC.

Heartbeats

One of Dr. Di Caro's proudest and most rewarding adventures has been as a member of The Heartbeats. The Heartbeats, now renamed The Jazz Medics, were a group of Houston doctors and friends who originally banded together to play for their own enjoyment. The group was organized in 1965 as the Heartstrings by Drs. Cooley and Hallman. This name was chosen because most of the physicians worked in the field of heart disease and string instruments predominated. Cooley played the upright bass and Hallman the trombone with Di Caro on percussion drums. The band soon recruited saxophones, trumpets, and additional trombones, thus the change from The Heartstrings to The Heartbeats.

At first the Heartbeats presented short programs at parties for their medical colleagues. They were soon asked to play at larger social events held to raise money for worthy causes such as the Texas Heart Institute of St. Luke's Episcopal and Texas Children's Hospitals. At these affairs, they shared the bandstand with some of Houston's outstanding dance bands, usually presenting 30-minute intermission programs. By 1969 the band numbered twenty-three members, and went national when they played in February for the annual banquet of the American College of Cardiology at the New York Hilton, sharing the program with George Jessel, John Gary, Myron Cohen, and Gloria Loring. In October of 1969, they performed at the Distinguished Alumni Awards Banquet at the University of Texas and were accompanied by Lyndon Johnson - 36th President of the United States - on the tambourine in "Tijuana Taxi." In February of 1971, the Heartbeats played at the National Gallery in Washington for the American College of Cardiology.

The Heartbeats have made two records and one tape. Proceeds benefit the Texas Heart Institute, and also helped in construction of the Baylor St. Luke's Medical Center and Texas Children's Hospital. They were: in 1968, "Presenting, The Heartbeats," and in 1972, "The Heartbeats Again." By the mid-70s the band's composition included doctors in a wide range of specialties. In 1974 it became The Jazz Medics. Today's band primarily performs at retirement homes, hospices, and private events in the Houston area.

It might be said that the man, Alexander Joseph Di Caro, Jr., lives daily by the classic motto spelled out in the old Jimmy Buffett ditto "with all of my running and all of my cunning, if I couldn't laugh, I would just go insane." Stay tuned!

IN MEMORIAM

Association, NRA Legion of Honor, and 100 Club supporter for decades.




